Message from the Board

This past Summer and Fall, the Museum hosted an extensive line up of events and activities, including First Responders History Night in partnership with the Denver Firefighters Museum, the launch of our new Traffic Safety program, fieldtrips and tours of the Museum, and a sign ceremony honoring fallen Denver Police Officer Richie Rose on the 100th anniversary of his line of duty death. Importantly, the Museum continues to work diligently with Denver Public Schools, the Denver Police Department, and the Denver Crime Lab to offer our STEM & Civics Enrichment Program to middle school youth. Focused on delivering immersive educational activities in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM), and civics, this program features five modules, including Police Tech, METRO/SWAT, 911 and Police Communications, Forensic Science, and Law & Order.

On May 26, the Museum partnered with the Denver Crime Lab to host the first Denver Forensic Science Day. Thirty-one students from Hamilton Middle School participated in this fun and science-filled event. This groundbreaking program is part of the Museum's efforts to advance STEM and law enforcement education and career exploration.

Pictured is a special presentation acknowledging the outstanding creative work and leadership from the Crime Lab team necessary to make this special event a success.

We would like to share our appreciation for the volunteers who have been instrumental in helping us successfully carry out these very important historical and educational programs—thank you!

Museum Honors Officer Richie Rose on the 100th Anniversary of His Line of Duty Death

The Rose Family

On October 31, 2022, the Museum hosted a sign ceremony honoring fallen Denver Police Officer Richie Rose on the 100th anniversary of his line of duty death on October 31, 1922.

Thanks to the work of our ancestry expert, Jeff Burke, the Museum was able to locate Officer Rose's family. Members of Officer Rose's family, including his grand and great grandchildren, joined us for this tribute.

Museum volunteer, Bill Finch, provided the necessary research to help us understand the historical context to this tragic event. Officer Rose's murder was never officially solved but it is widely believed that he was a victim of a mafia hit. His last words were "...mafia, mafia, mafia." ●



Denver Police Officer Honored for Service

Denver Police Officer Robert Sandoval Honored Decades After Being Shot

The Denver Police Museum and the National Latino Peace Officers Association hosted two extremely successful events for Hispanic Heritage Month, including a sign dedication honoring Officer Robert Eugene Sandoval who was shot on October 14, 1969 by a frightened homeowner while investigating a possible burglary in progress.

Sandoval died in 2020 and this year, his name was added to the fallen police memorial, an honor typically reserved for those killed in the line of duty.

On September 22, 2022, the Denver Police Museum honored Officer Sandoval's sacrifice with a memorial sign ceremony. Councilperson Debbie Ortega also sponsored a proclamation to officially acknowledge Officer Sandoval and his family.

On September 27, 2022, CBS News/Channel 4 shared Officer Sandoval's story,

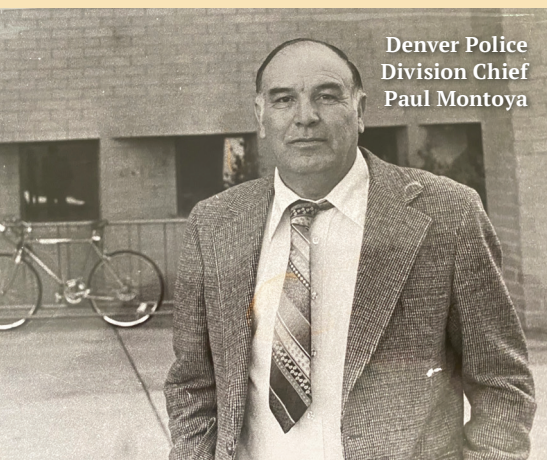
Twenty-five middle school students from Whittier ECE-8 and Bruce Randolph participated in immersive educational activities, including a behind the scenes experience with the Denver Police

Department's Real Time Crime Center, hands on learning with the bomb squad, a tour of the Museum, and an interactive look at the technology advancement of police cars. Students got an up-close look at the Museum's historic police cars while Officers Wilkerson and Vento from the Citywide IMPACT Team showed off the technology and safety features of a modern police car.

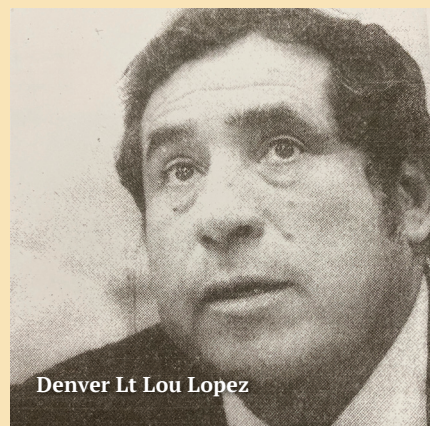

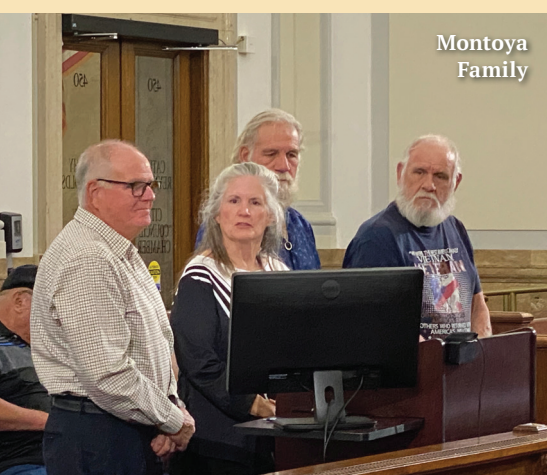

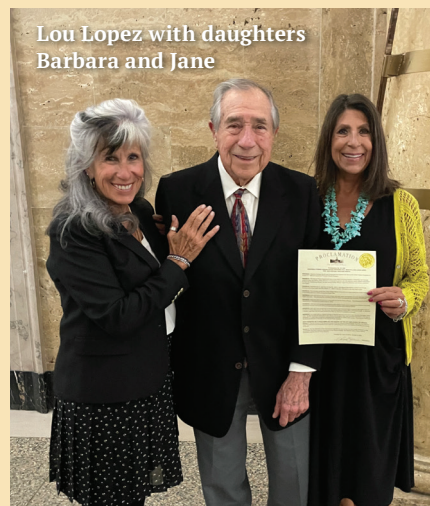

Squad IV – Volume One (Silver and Blue)

Squad IV was organized in October of 1972 with the goal of improving community outreach. Captain Doral Smith, Commander of the Northeast Denver Police substation felt that music might provide a unique opportunity for police to connect with youth.

The Squad IV Denver Police Band's inaugural concert was held at

over Colorado including appearances with BB King at the Denver Coliseum as well as opening for the Oak Ridge Boys and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band.

The band went on to record two albums and was so successful that it was able to become self-sufficient, receiving funding from its record and ticket sales. Volume One (Silver and Blue) contained four songs – “I Believe in Music” (Mac Davis cover), “Proud Mary” (Creedence Clearwater Revival/Ike and Tina Turner cover), and “Steamroller Blues” (James Taylor cover)/“Joy to the World” (Three Dog Night cover). The band's albums are preserved in the Museum's collection.

The members of the Squad IV Denver Police Band included Officer Dave Kechter, bass guitar, and vocals; Officer Paige Lyda, rhythm guitar and vocals; Officer Mike Gargaro lead guitar, electric piano and vocals; and Wulf Krokkel on drums.
