September. Ralph will bring a lifetime of service and experience to the museum leadership.

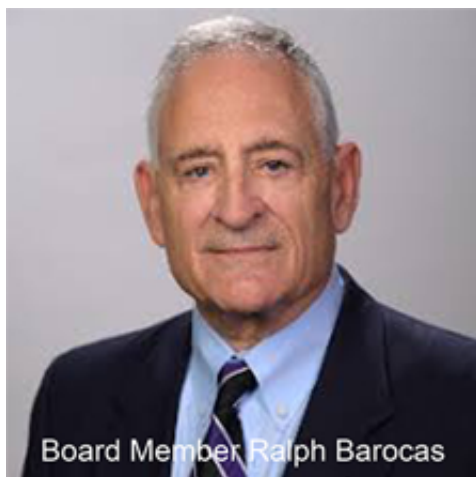

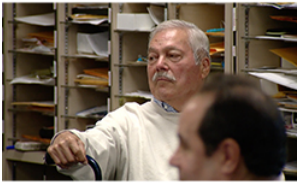


## Annual Hispanic Heritage Trailblazer Award

The Denver Police Museum was honored to have a special visitor stop by Headquarters with his 1978 Los Angeles Sheriff's Nova on Friday September 26. Here is his story:



# **A story about the comeback of 1978 Chevy Nova 9C1 original LA County police car...and saving a piece of GM history.**

I love the 4th Generation Novas. My first car was a 1976 2-door Chevy Nova and it was perfect in my eyes. Decades later, I bought another one and my interest only grew from there. In my mind, I always thought how it would be amazing to find and own an original Nova police car. In August 2022, that dream became a reality when I found a partially restored 1977 Nova 9C1 police car, originating from the Columbia, MO police department.

My fascination for these cars only grew from there. Months later, in November 2022, I found another Nova 9C1, and set out on a country-wide road trip to purchase it. This was a 1978 4 door located in the California desert. It was painted a very ugly green, and while the body was solid, it was in rough condition. The interior was there, but the California sun destroyed the dash. The seats were torn apart. But, it still drove! It needed some TLC but definitely savable. I knew enough that it was in fact the GM police car package based on the basic signs, but there were still many questions about its history which needed further investigation.

Is finding these Nova 9C1's important? Unequivocally, yes. Because these cars have suffered a staggering attrition rate. Of the 13,800 Nova 9C1's which were produced by GM from 1975 through 1978, only 28 are known to have survived. And the whereabouts of some of the 28 survivors are unknown to this day.

After completing the very long road trip back to NH with the Nova, the next question was, what is the car's history? After contacting the GM Heritage Archives Service, I was able to obtain a copy of the original factory invoice that this car was purchased under the GM - LA County contract. This was significant, because GM worked with the LA County Sheriff Department to test the Nova against other comparable police cars of the era. The Nova 9C1 came out on top in testing results, and the LA County Sheriff Department ordered 222 units in 1975. I also learned the car was retired from its public service in 1981 and purchased at auction.

The next question was when, and how, this car would be restored. I had no idea. While I love Novas, I'm not a mechanic and I don't have the experience,

tools nor space to fully restore a car. But I had the will and I followed my vision.

In late 2022, while perusing Facebook, I found Brian James, who had restored his own 4th Generation Nova. I watched some of his videos on his YouTube channel called “Three Rivers Wrench”. I was very impressed by his approach and attention to detail with restoring his Nova, and immediately contacted him to see if he was interested in taking on a new project.

After months of planning, the project became a reality! And so in April 2023, the restoration of this 1978 Nova 9C1 officially began. This was an exceptional opportunity to highlight the car, its history, and what it would take to bring it back to its original LA County roots. The entire restoration was covered on Brian’s YouTube channel.

A decision was also made to dedicate this car to the memory of a fallen Los Angeles County Sheriff deputy, Deputy Walter Hannan, Jr., who died on duty while driving a 1978 Nova 9C1. Deputy Hannan was responding to the aid of a fellow deputy. He was riding alongside retired Deputy Ernie Archuleta. A car pulled in front of their Nova and Deputy Hannan swerved to avoid a collision, but lost control and hit a light pole. Deputy Ernie Archuleta survived the accident but had to medically retire from the department due to injuries he sustained.

In terms of the restoration, everything was addressed, top to bottom. Repairs were made, and parts were either restored or replaced with new. Brian James of Three Rivers Wrench was meticulous about addressing every system of the car. Electrical, mechanical, and cosmetic aspects were all restored and installed masterfully. I’m fortunate to know many people in Nova collector circles which enabled me to secure many parts. I bought some Nova parts cars as well. I also leveraged Facebook marketplace and numerous other online sources to source hard to find parts. We relied on other experts for the seat upholstery, the windshield installation, vinyl graphics, sandblasting and the emergency equipment installation.

In September of 2025, the project was completed. I’ve included before and after photos. This has been a tremendous success story which required ongoing communication and coordination. Not only has the car been restored, but so has a significant piece of law enforcement history. The Chevy Nova 9C1 is

classified as a compact police car. It was developed to address the rising costs of police car operation, including fuel and maintenance costs, following the 1973 oil embargo. This Nova 9C1 featured the 350 ci engine, F41 suspension system, and many other heavy duty features, to hold up to the rigor of police car work.
